UPDATE ON PROJECTS

Hungerford Skate Park Project

Back in January 2022, a survey was produced to gain feedback from users of the Hungerford Skate Park telling us what they'd like to see with a new improved facility. After months of meetings, consultations and reviewing plans with our appointed contractor, Maverick Industries Ltd, the work is now complete. This is such an exciting community space for the town. We have a modern, all wheeled facility for users of all ages and abilities. Time to dust off those bikes, skateboards, and scooters.

Croft Field Activity Centre

In 2015, we took on a 99-year lease of the centre and field from West Berkshire Council when it was under threat from being demolished and the land sold. Our aim was to protect the facility for use by the community, but it was certainly in need of a refurb. After many months of building work, we're so pleased to now have a refurbished community space.

The centre consists of two redecorated halls, brand new showers and toilets, storage and cooking facilities. It is also now fully accessible for wheelchair use with ramps and a wider lighter corridor and foyer. There is a serving hatch for outside events which can be

held on the field or under the gazebo. The field has gated access to the canal and electric hook up.



If you're looking for somewhere to hold a family party, special event, fetes, bootcamps, overnight camping, regular classes or work events, the whole facility can be hired or just parts of the building. Neighbourhood Plan H2036

The Neighbourhood Plan is making progress. We have a draft text of the Plan and the detailed evaluations of the housing allocations completed.

The Plan covers the whole parish for the period 2024 to 2039 and will be used to plan for Hungerford's future and determine planning applications alongside the West Berkshire Local Plan.

The Plan Vision

Hungerford sits at the heart of the North Wessex Downs AONB and is treasured for being an historic market town set within beautiful and accessible countryside and waterways.

The residents of Hungerford seek to work together to embrace constructive change that ensures a vibrant, robust and sustainable economy that will enhance their prosperity and provide an affordable and nurturing environment for current and future generations.

This should be achieved whilst conserving Hungerford's natural and manmade heritage and enhancing its strong sense of being a caring community and a fulfilling place to live.

There are chapters in the Plan under the following headings:

- Housing
- Employment and economy
- Getting about
- Leisure, Wellbeing, Public Safety and Learning
- Our heritage
- Climate change and biodiversity

In each of these there are aims, objectives and proposals.

Housing Site Allocation

The Neighbourhood Plan has to allocate sites to deliver a minimum of 55 dwellings to comply with the West Berkshire Emerging Local Plan. If it doesn't, then the Emerging Local Plan will do this and the community will have less say over which sites are chosen.

After careful and detailed evaluation of many sites around the town several sites have been identified that represent sustainable and deliverable options.

An informal consultation to obtain residents views and comments will take place in The Corn Exchange building on:

- Wednesday November 1st upstairs in the Town Hall 2pm to 4pm and 7pm to 9pm
- Saturday November 4th in the Magistrates Room 10am to Midday

This will be your chance to comment on the alternative housing sites and we look forward to seeing you there.

Way Forward

The main next stages for the Plan are:

- Complete the Draft Plan
- Send this to West Berkshire Council for comments
- Formal six week consultation, early 2024
- Public examination, mid 2024
- Public referendum on the Plan, autumn 2024

UPDATE ON EVENTS

King Charles III Coronation

Coinciding with many events across the country, Hungerford joined in celebrations for the Coronation of King Charles III with Hungerford Town Council organising music and entertainment on the Croft Green.

Residents were encouraged to bring picnics and grab a seat and after a warm welcome from Hungerford's Mayor, Cllr Simpson, the crowd enjoyed music from the Hungerford



Town Band, as well as singing from Abbie Cleary, James Johnson, Kat Jayne and Hungerford Theatre Group plus a special guest appearance. This was followed by accordion playing, as well as a local DJ which saw the crowd singing and dancing along. Food and drinks were also available throughout from pop up shops on the green. A special thanks to Hungerford Club who hosted the committee for several months whilst we planned the event.

Grants

Hungerford Town Council operates an annual grants scheme whereby grants are awarded to local organisations offering services to Hungerford residents. Grants are usually awarded in May / June with an awards ceremony taking place in September. Although we can consider late grants, please note that there is no guarantee funds will be available later in the year. Hungerford Town Council administers its grants scheme via The Good Exchange website and encourages all applications to be made directly on The Good Exchange website in-order to be considered for matched funding.

Cllr Helen Simpson

As the current Hungerford Mayor, serving my 6th term, I feel privileged to serve Hungerford’s wonderful community. As ex officio on all committees, I try to attend as many meetings as possible, gaining a full insight and becoming fully informed on all tasks.



As well as being chair of the council, I also chair the Recreations and Amenities (R&A) committee. R&A look after the town’s parks, cemetery, war memorials, community gardens and open spaces.

Hungerford Town Council has been incredibly busy with two major projects. The first is the complete renovation of the Croft Field Activity Centre. The centre is just about complete, we’ve made the building fully accessible, with new disabled toilets and showers. I’m thrilled we can now offer the community a vibrant space to hire and enjoy.

Cllr Nick Schlanker

"The members of the Highways and Transport committee, which I chair, have had a busy year. The accident just before Christmas caused and continues to cause disruption to the town and has drawn attention to the risk of cars speeding in our community. Many residents have asked about the repair to the shop and the removal of the lights. Frustratingly it has taken longer than expected to get repairs underway, and we continue to monitor the state of the building and any risk it might be to people walking past. We have met with West Berkshire Council (WBC) several times to look at the challenges of having a major 'A' road running through the centre of the town. We are at the early stages of discussing the introduction of 20mph zones in the residential parts of the town and plan to consult widely in the new year to gauge the towns views of having lower speeds areas in parts of Hungerford.

We have now got three Speed Indicator Devices (SID) that help us monitor the traffic flowing through the town which provides us with detailed data about speeding. If budgets allow, we'd like to have further SIDs in the



town as we have found them useful in slowing drivers and improving road safety. This winter we shall look to redeploy one of the SIDs to monitor traffic on Park and Church Street where residents have raised concerns about speeding to the council.

Outside the town, councillors have walked the many footpaths and byways that surround us to provide feedback to the WBC so that they are able to better manage the paths and keep them clear of obstructions and overgrowth. We have identified issues such as broken styles, blocked rights of way access and missing signs which we'll work with WBC to get resolved in the coming months.

There have been challenges with the collection of dog waste across the town. We have worked with WBC to discuss the contract and how collection could be improved so we don't have a repeat of the overflowing bins next summer."

Cllr Keith Knight

"I am chair of Hungerford Hub & Community Trust and Chain Mail, which keeps me very busy. I have also been the editor of Chain Mail since 2022. I have been a resident and part of the council for many years now and enjoyed every moment."



Cllr Stella Coulthurst

"As a brand-new councillor, I have a lot to learn about how the processes of local government work and the levers we must contribute to Hungerford as a place to live and work, relax and enjoy. My first aim will be to help deliver the Council's objectives – giving a voice to residents, providing a liaison between the town and other authorities, and working hard to enhance our thriving town. It's a great time to get involved, with the 2036 Neighbourhood Plan taking real shape alongside the everyday business of managing public areas, planning applications and our amenities."

Tony Drewer-Trump


