The Neighbourhood Plan

This document represents the Neighbourhood Plan for Hungerford parish for the period 2024 to 2041. The Plan contains a vision for the future of Hungerford and sets out clear planning policies to realise this vision.

The Plan builds on the extensive work carried out by the community in the development of the Hungerford 2010+ Plan (2005) and Town Plan Refresh from 2013. These included:

- detailed household survey work
- policies and actions for all the main issues

The principal purpose of the Neighbourhood Plan is to guide development within the parish. It also provides guidance to anyone wishing to submit a planning application for development within the parish. The process of producing a plan has sought to involve the community as widely as possible. The different topic areas are reflective of matters that are of considerable importance to Hungerford, its residents, businesses and community groups.

West Berkshire have been updating their Local Plan and we remain consistent with this Plan which is a requirement of the Neighbourhood Plan.

There has been some good progress this year that has included:

- Consultation over the development options for the town
- A completed draft document of the Plan
- Production of a Strategic Environmental Assessment and Habitats Regulation Assessment
- An extensive formal consultation, known as the 'regulation 14 consultation' on the latest Neighbourhood Plan. This has included extensive comments from West Berkshire Council
- Updating the plan in view of all the comments from consultees. The changes have been fairly minor, and the housing allocations are unchanged.
- Preparation of documents ready for the final consultation stage which is done by West Berkshire Council.

It has been seven years in the making so far!... but we hope after the final consultation to have the Neighbourhood Plan ready for a referendum sometime in 2025.




HUNGERFORD EVENTS UPDATE

Hungerford's D-Day 80th Anniversary

The D-Day celebration in Hungerford on the weekend of 28 to 30 June 2024 was probably the largest and most impressive event the town has hosted.

"Event", singular, is wrong, however, as there were several – historical talks and displays, a 1940s dance, a big band in the Town Hall, a parade by REME down the High Street to mark Armed Forces Day, displays of military vehicles, a parachute display, a vehicle convoy, a veteran's parade to the Common, wartime games and crafts for the kids in the Town Hall and the unveiling of a plaque to mark Eisenhower's speech to the Allied troops in August 1944. There were also, as one would expect, plenty of flags and bunting and a several examples of 1940s-style clothes and music. A weekend to remember in commemoration of an event that should not be forgotten.

Indeed, "commemoration" was one of the three aims of the weekend, the other being "education and celebration". Few would deny that all these were achieved. There was also a fourth equally successful aim, with nearly £6,000 raised for the RBL Hungerford Branch. (including the RBL Poppy Appeal and Ladies division).

GRANTS

Hungerford Town Council operates an annual grant scheme whereby grants are awarded to local organisations offering services to Hungerford Residents. Grants are usually awarded in May / June with an awards ceremony taking place later in the year. HTC administers its grant scheme via The Good

Exchange website and encourages all applications to be made directly on their website in order to be considered for matched funding.

ANNUAL GRANT AWARD CEREMONY

In October this year Hungerford Town Council held a joint civic ceremony to present the grant recipients and winners of the Hungerford in Bloom competition with their certificates and prizes.

The first set of awards were held to formerly recognise the deserving local charities and groups of this year's grants. The annual grant award ceremony is a firm favourite on the mayor's calendar. The number of deserving organisations and charities offering advice, encouragement and support to our community is so very humbling especially during recent economic times.

TIM CROUTER and SANDIE CROUTER

Tim Crouter took over as Musical Director of Hungerford Town Band in 1994 and Sandie joined the band in the couple of years proceeding this and between them, they have been leading the band ever since. 2024 marks their 30th anniversary –an amazing achievement.

Hungerford now has a training band for local children and Tim offers tutoring for brass and woodwind instruments within the local primary school and other local schools along with private tuition.

Sandy joined the band and along the way has taken on many responsibilities including treasurer, band librarian, engagement secretary and concert organiser. She also supports Tim with the Junior band and with tuition where needed. Thank you for your continued dedication to youth development and for ensuring the bands rankings in the UK Brass Band world today, leading them to national contest success.

The band play at all of the local community events e.g. Mayor's Carol Concert, Remembrance Day Parade and Poppy Concert, the D-Day Commemorations, to name a few. We

are thankful for the countless hours of the time they commit to the band and local community.

BARBARA BARR

Barbara was a long serving Trustee to the Town & Manor and became the first female Constable in 500 years, shattering long-standing gender barriers. include fundraising for the fire station, the swimming pool, cricket pavilion and many other causes. She was also an active member of the United Reformed Church and set up the Junior Church. Her involvement with the Tuttipole restaurant, she was president of the Town Band for 3 years, St John's ambulance cadets for around 20 years and Chairman of the Ladybird Mother and Toddler group.

Barbara was a teacher at John O Gaunt school for over 25 years. As a stalwart supporter of Hocktide, Barbara organised the Tutti girls each year, firstly at school and after retiring by liaising with school on behalf of Town & Manor which she did for 23 years.

SUSAN MAYES

In 1988, when Susan moved to Hungerford, she was an Art and Textile teacher in Calne. These skills were rapidly put to work, making costumes for the historical community play "1688: The Hungerford Connection". These skills are evident today as Susan created many of the panels in the Hungerford Millennium Embroidery, and it would be hard to count the amount of event bunting that has been churned out of her trusty sewing machine! Quite a lot of this bunting was used by Chilton Foliat Primary School, where Susan was head of the Parents Association for six years.

Susan became an active committee member and then treasurer of the Hungerford Friends of Cancer Research. Although this group is no more, Susan continues her fund-raising within a group that organises dolls house sales and auctions, which each year raises thousands of pounds for Cancer Research UK. The latter is also a labour of love, as Susan is a keen collector of dolls-houses, antique toyshops and

other curios, which is why she can often be found browsing and helping out, in the Hungerford Arcade.

The arts are in Susan's blood, so in 2017, working with Tony Drewer-Trump, she played a major role in designing and delivering the Hungerford Art Trail. She also supported HADCAF, persuading schools to participate, and helping to set-up exhibitions of students' artwork.

Susan was a very enthusiastic and practical member of the committee for Hungerford's 80th D-Day Commemoration Weekend. She designed and delivered the ration card tour of the town and the children's craft activities that captivated and included a younger generation in the event. On a weekly basis, Susan is perhaps most noticeable in her Smarten Up Hungerford tabard, working in the team of volunteers that plants and maintains Hungerford's beautiful floral displays; as well as collecting litter, and other disgusting items, strewn about our town. In between looking after her grandchildren, Susan will soon be embarking on her annual poppy collecting for the British Legion.



Bridge Street War Memorial

We have had the War Memorial cleaned in time for Remembrance Day and it now looks splendid. We are planning the cleaning of the paving stones surrounding the War Memorial, again in time for the Remembrance Day Parade.

Remembrance Day

Hungerford will be joining communities around the country as we mark Remembrance Day on Sunday 10th November. The parade will leave the Town Hall at 10.38 and make its way to the Bridge Street Memorial for 10.45. The Remembrance Service will take place from 10.45 – 11.20. The Laying of the wreaths will be carried out by the army and other services in attendance as well as local community and voluntary groups.

We particularly welcome veterans or serving members of the forces to join our parade and please look out for the gathering point outside the Town Hall, that will be signed on the day.

Hungerford Town Council has been approached by local residents keen to establish a 'Hungerford Community Shed' for the benefit of the town's residents. From a possible 15 possible locations in Hungerford, they have decided that the Croft Field Centre is ideal, having been recently refurbished, with parking, accessible toilets and is immediately available and expandable, if necessary, in the future.

Community Sheds are a non-profit organisation that provides a space for craftwork and social interaction. The movement originated in Australia in 1980 and there are now thousands worldwide and 1130 in the UK. There are hundreds of people in Hungerford who will benefit from support with loneliness, wellbeing issues and the Hungerford Shed is seen as an ideal way to offer such support. 
